OVERVIEW

The third Africa Waste Is Wealth Summit (AWWS III), scheduled for June 3-5, 2026, in Nairobi, Kenya, marks a significant milestone as the **official International Solid Waste Association (ISWA) Africa Regional Conference**. Held under the auspices of the ISWA Africa Regional Chapter (ISWA ARC) and in partnership with the **Government of Kenya's Ministry of Investments, Trade and Industry**, the Summit is a primary vehicle for advancing circular economy frameworks, sustainable waste management systems, and Africa's broader climate commitments.

AWWS III is an implementation and investment platform that transforms policy dialogue into bankable projects. It aligns governments, development partners, investors and industry to structure partnerships, mobilize resources and scale integrated waste and circular economy infrastructure across Africa.
